

Grade Level: Kindergarten

Subject: Language

Objective: By the end of the lesson, students will be able to retell the story "Jungle Buddyz: A Race to Remember" using key details and describe how the characters helped Scooter feel confident.

Materials:

- Story "Jungle Buddyz: A Race to Remember"
- Whiteboard or chart paper
- Markers
- Picture cards of the characters (optional)
- Breathing exercise visual (optional)

Introduction:

- 1. Display the title "Jungle Buddyz: A Race to Remember" on the board or chart paper.
- 2. Begin by asking students if they have ever heard a story about animals who are friends and go on adventures together.
- 3. Show them the picture cards of the characters and ask if they can guess the names of the animals.
- 4. Introduce the story by telling the students that they will be reading about the Jungle Buddyz and a race they participated in.

Story Comprehension:

- 1. Read the story "Jungle Buddyz: A Race to Remember" aloud to the students, pausing to show the corresponding pictures and engage them in discussions about the characters and events.
- 2. After reading, ask comprehension questions to check their understanding of the story:
 - Who are the Jungle Buddyz?
 - Why was Scooter feeling nervous?
 - How did Milo, Lincoln, Gabby, and Flick help Scooter feel confident?
- What happened at the end of the race?

Discussion and Reflection:

- 1. Lead a discussion about the story using the following prompts:
- How do you think Scooter felt at the beginning of the race? How did his friends help him feel better?
- Have you ever been nervous about trying something new? How did you overcome your nerves?
- How do you think Scooter felt after completing the race, even though he didn't win?
- Why do you think it's important for friends to support and encourage each other?

Conclusion:

- 1. Summarize the story by reminding the students about the Jungle Buddyz, Scooter's nervousness, and how his friends helped him feel confident.
- 2. Discuss the lesson learned from the story, emphasizing the importance of believing in oneself and the power of friendship.
- 3. Ask the students if they can think of a time when they supported or encouraged a friend.

Extension Activity:

- 1. Invite the students to create their own Jungle Buddy character, giving them a name and describing their special qualities.
- 2. Ask the students to draw a picture of their Jungle Buddy and write a sentence or two describing their character's unique abilities or talents.
- 3. Share their drawings and descriptions with the class, encouraging the students to explain why their Jungle Buddy is a good friend.
